Environmental, is intended to give interested residents some tools to act as responsible stewards of the environment in their everyday lives.

Scio Township is now entering the third year of its single-waste hauler contract with GFL

and one consequence of this transition is a significant increase in curbside recycling. We also reduced recycling contamination with the help of the 2021 recycling

audit conducted by the county's resource management collective WRRMA. GFL's

Acceptable Materials Guidelines flyer (on p. 2) will help residents maintain this trend. Scio residents now have a dedicated customer service phone number at GFL: 734-224-5582. In addition, complaints or other types of feedback are emailed to GFL and the Township Supervisor when you use the form at Sciotownship.org/GFLfeedback.

EGLE's inverted Sustainability pyramid at right reminds us to, first, REDUCE consumption. Renting is an environmentally responsible alternative to purchasing. Find local borrowing and renting services in the **Trash to Treasure Guide** found at Washtenaw.org.

Scio Township is home to several excellent resources to support REUSE and REPURPOSE efforts. (The map on p. 4 will help you locate these local gems.) For example, generations of bargain-hunters have enjoyed the weekend thrift sales run by the **Kiwanis Club** of Ann Arbor on the Township's far west side. Similarly, the **Habitat for Humanity Restore** sells donated goods at prices below the cost of new and uses the profits to fund their charitable work. Another convenient resource for donating or purchasing used items is **The ShareHouse**.

Tips to Reduce Food Waste at FDA.gov to find practical ideas that can save the average family as much as \$1600 a year in reduced food bills. And GFL now offers a **Recycling Rewards program** (enrollment information is on the back of this newsletter). It's nice to be rewarded for something you're already doing!

For the RECYCLE level of EGLE's Sustainability model, posting GFL's Acceptable Materials Guidelines near your recycle bins may help keep recycling contamination low. When the efforts of our recycling can be sold at the best prices available because of low rates of contamination, the recycling endeavor is more likely to be self-supporting. For those items on the "unacceptable" list, county residents can rely on the **Home Toxics Center** to keep many items out of the landfill (a comprehensive list of accepted items is on p. 5). Bulky items such as tires, furniture, and appliances can be brought to one of the County Clean-Up Days (see dates on p. 3) or to the Recycle Ann Arbor Recovery Yard (#5 on the Recycle Map).

Still not sure what to do with that thing you want to get rid of? Look it up on the **Waste**Wizard at wrrma.org, a comprehensive database of recyclable items and locations that accept them.

These events are for Washtenaw County residents only. Materials from businesses, government agencies, non-profits, or other organizations are not accepted.

Typically accepted items include household hazardous waste, electronics, bulky waste, tires, and appliances. Check our website for specific details of each event.

Please consider a **minimum donation of \$15.00** to help support these events. Checks and cash are accepted at the event. Please make checks payable to Washtenaw County.

Bring 4 tires for free. We suggest a donation of \$5 for each additional tire. **Limit of 10 tires.**

Bring 1 TV or freon appliance for free. We suggest a donation of \$10 for each additional item.



Registration will be required to attend any County Clean-Up Day.

This change will allow us to better serve residents by spacing out event traffic arrival time.

This strategy will significantly reduce wait times and reduce carbon emissions caused by idling cars at the event

Additional information regarding location, time and materials accepted will be disclosed during registration.



Located at 705 N Zeeb Rd. – next to
Scio Township Hall - the HTC is for Washtenaw

County residents only and cannot accept materials from a business, government entity, or other organization. Appointments are encouraged for weekday drop-offs.
